Dress Code Highlights

No crop top shirts

Tights, form fitting pants, leggings, jeggings, spandex, exercise pants and yoga pants must be covered by mid length shorts, skirts, or long shirts which cover the bottom.

Campus I.D. Expectations

- ALL student's and faculty members are required to wear an ID badge.
- The ID Badge will be required for bus transportation, to purchase school breakfast and lunches, all library transactions, extracurricular activities (football games, etc.)
- ID Badge and lanyard that must be always worn around the neck with Name and Picture visible. (**NOT ON YOUR backpack**)
- Students will be issued the first ID Badge, cover, and lanyard at no cost to them.



Campus I.D. Expectations



- Lost or broken lanyards will be replaced for \$1.00.
 - Lost, broken, or defaced cases will be replaced for \$1.00.
 - Students are expected to maintain the student ID badge from year to year.
 - Failure to comply with regulations may result in disciplinary action.

ARRIVALS

- To ensure the continued safety of our campus, students that drive must be in the parking lot by 7:10 a.m.
- All gates will be closed by 7:18 a.m.
- If you arrive after 7:18 a.m., you must report to the front office to obtain access to the parking lot.

SAFETY

- Students are not permitted to open doors for anyone, not even their teachers.
- Students should not prop doors open.
- If you see something, say something to an adult!
- Students should have their ID badge on and visible every day.
 - Your ID tells staff that you belong on campus and helps keep intruders out.

After School Campus Expectations

- After school, students must exit the building unless they have extracurricular or tutorials.
- Buses leave the parking lot by 2:55 pm.
 - Students must be with a GCM staff member within 10 minutes of the 2:50 pm bell.
 - If you are caught in the school without a GCM staff member after 2:50 pm, you will be considered trespassing.
- **Athletes** are not allowed to re-enter the school after practice.
 - **Athletes** will need to get picked up by the athletic exit doors in the back.
- **Fine Arts** extracurricular participants need to exit out the main street doors on the East side of the building.
- Teachers will escort all **tutorial students** out of the front of the school or out of the student parking lot.

ATTENDANCE




- You must be present at least 90% of the time in order to receive credit for taking a class.
- If you miss 2 or more days within the first four weeks of school, we will assign you one day of attendance recovery in September and have a truancy officer visit your home.
- We will also set up an attendance conference with your parents to have them sign an attendance contract.

PARKING PASS

- Parking passes are given out in the 10th grade office with Ms. Purifoy.
 - Price is \$20
- Applications are online.
 - You will have to upload a copy of your insurance and driver's license.
- Parking permit will be revoked if you are tardy to school more than 5 times.



FIRST DAY INSTRUCTIONS

- When you arrive at school, you can either go to the cafeteria for breakfast or wait on Main Street for school to begin.
 - When the bell to go to 1st period rings, you will report to your first period class.
 - Your 1st period class will be posted on the signs on Main Street.
 - You will be given your schedule and ID that morning during first period.

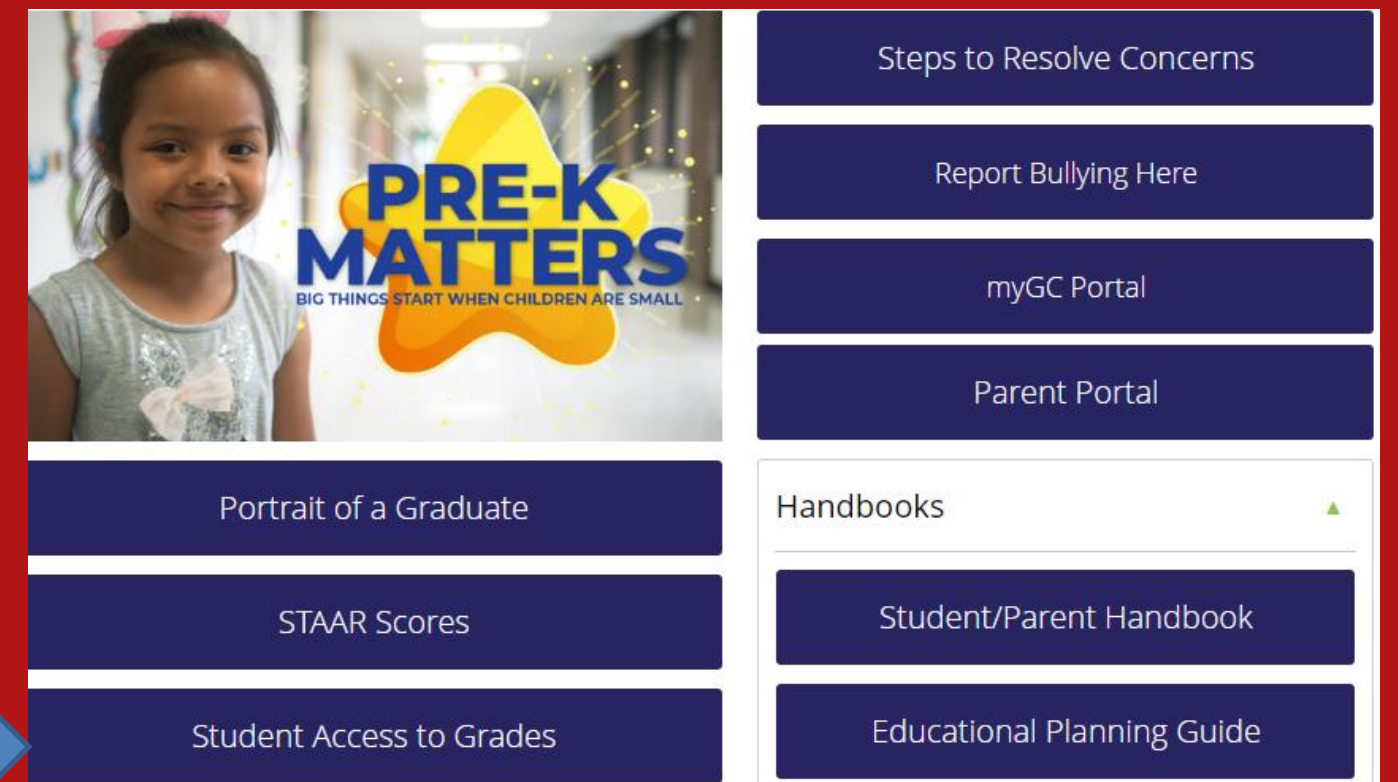
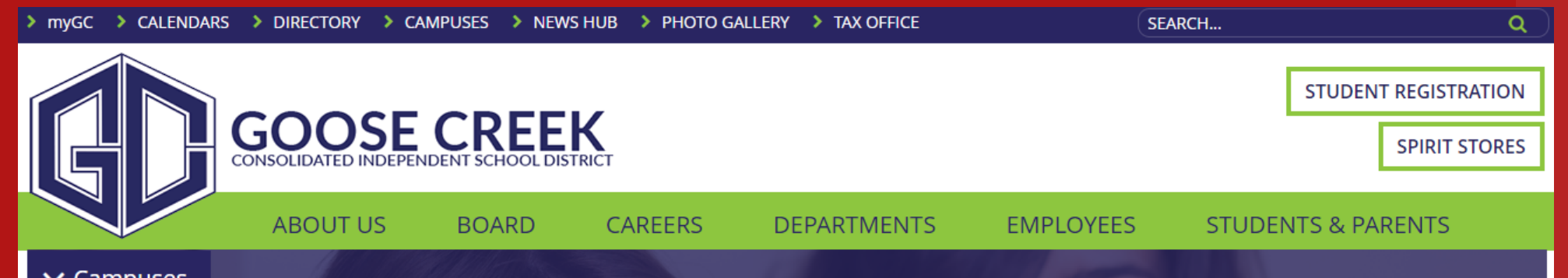
GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS



- **26 Credits** in the right combination of courses.
- **Grades matter!**
 - You must have at least a 70 average to receive credit for the semester.
- **Attendance matters!**
 - You can lose credit, even if you pass, if you fall under 90% attendance.
- **EOC Scores**
 - English 1, Algebra 2, Biology, English 2, US History
 - If you have not passed an EOC, your retest will be in December (and again in the Spring if needed).

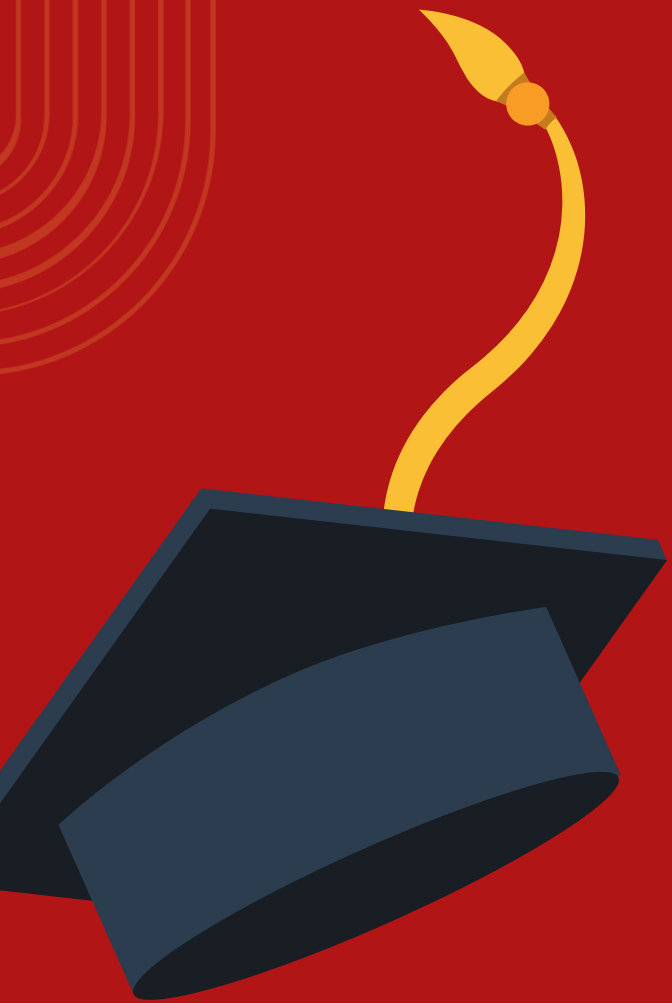
STUDENT PORTAL

STEPS for College



1. **Apply to college** – Apply Texas, Common App., Coalition, specific to college
2. **Send test scores** – ACT or SAT or TSI (SAT send at Collegeboard.org)
 - Community colleges TSI only- BUT SAT/ACT may be needed for scholarships
 - TSI testing at GCM
3. **Send high school transcript** – online registrar form –
GCM website – Student records and transcript request (left side)
4. **Send college transcript if dual** – online - Lee College
5. **Mail fee waiver to college admissions office** - if indicated fee waiver on application
6. **Fill out FAFSA** – ALWAYS – even if you don't get money – needed for some scholarships
